STEWARTSTOWN – Jay D. Green, 89, of Stewartstown, died at his home on Friday, Feb. 14, 2025, after a long period of ill health and with his caretakers by his side.

He was born in Pittsfield, N.H., on May 12, 1935, a son to the late Jay H. and Beulah (Willard) Green. Jay served with honor in the U.S. Army from 1953-56 as a paratrooper in the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions, with 128 jumps on his service record. He was a proud veteran of the Korean Conflict.

After his military service, Jay worked in the construction industry as a heavy equipment operator for many years. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, and riding his ATV. He was a member of the American Legion. Jay made many friends in the local area and used to enjoy going to the Spa Restaurant for breakfast each day to visit.

Jay is survived by his son, Michael Green and his wife Tina of Laconia; his sister, Shirley Eastman and her husband Skip of Loudon; three grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren; several nieces and nephews; and his special friends and caretakers, Olga and Curtis Tilton, Raymond Brown, Joe Willard and Roland Moore.

He is predeceased by his beloved wife, Sheila (Blake) Green in 2021, and

three brothers, Almer, Morris and Oliver Green.
