NORTH STRATFORD – Maurice ‘Tommy’ M. Fogg, 86, of North Stratford, died on Wednesday, March 9, 2022, at the Morrison Nursing Home in Whitefield, N.H.

He was born in Milan, N.H., on July 12, 1935, to the late Alton and Dorothy (Peabody) Fogg.

After moving to the Kidderville area of East Colebrook, he worked on the farm until the family moved down the road to ‘Factory Village’ where he attended the one-room schoolhouse there. Later he attended Colebrook Academy and graduated in 1954, while also working for Grady Lyons on the farm.

After graduation, he entered the Marine Corps and served for 4 years. Tommy was always very proud to be a Marine, even in his later years. After his military service, he worked several jobs before ending up at The Balsams where he tended the boilers in the heating plant. He retired after many years and bought his home in North Stratford.

Tommy was predeceased by 5 brothers: Ray, Roy, Gordon, Ralph and Gene. He leaves behind two brothers, Norman (Ted) in Columbia, N.H., and Alfred Fogg of Brookline, Mass. He is also survived by his best friend of many years, Roger Couture. Roger always went beyond the call of duty, having meals

together and taking Tommy out for rides every day. He was at Tommy's side when he passed away.

Tommy was an extremely generous person to his neighbors and even brought up three boys like they were his own sons.
