



## Thelma M. Fogg

May 13, 1910 - February 16, 2010

COLEBROOK, NH -- Mrs. Thelma Mae Fogg, 99, of Colebrook, NH, passed away on Tuesday afternoon, February 16, 2010, at the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital in Colebrook, after a period of failing health.

She was born May 13, 1910, a daughter of Walter S. and Irva (Wiswell) Goodwin.

Thelma was a graduate of Colebrook Academy in the Class of 1929. Following graduation, she worked at Gilkey's Store on Main Street from 1930-38. In 1938, she married Kilburn Covell and they moved to his farm in Columbia, NH. After his death in January 1960, she lived on the farm until that summer, when she sold it and moved back to Colebrook. In 1966, she married Alton Fogg.

Mrs. Fogg was a member of the Trinity United Methodist Church in Colebrook.

Thelma is survived by two daughters, Linda Colby of West Stewartstown, and Marylu Granquist of Colebrook; six stepsons, Ray Fogg of Hollywood, Fl., Gordon Fogg of Columbia, Maurice "Tommy" Fogg of North Stratford, Ralph Fogg of Colebrook, Alfred Fogg of Brookline, Mass., and Norman Fogg of Colebrook; two grandchildren, Shori McKinnon of Beecher Falls, Vt.; and Shawn Colby of Colebrook; and two great-grandchildren, Rebecca and

Christopher Thibeault.

She is preceded in death by her parents, her two husbands, and her siblings, Melba Bryan, Gordon Goodwin, Donald Goodwin and Pearle Annis.

At her specific request, there are no calling hours. A graveside service will occur at the family lot in the Colebrook Village Cemetery in the spring on what would have been her 100th birthday, Thursday, May 13, 2010. The time will be determined at a later date.
